the latest evaluation of legislative performance, the Hazlitt Coalition and our allies in the Freedom Caucus emerged as the clear victor, significantly outscoring their establishment counterparts in the state's House of Representatives. This scorecard, designed to measure the commitment of lawmakers to conservative principles, reveals a stark contrast between the two factions, highlighting a growing divide within the Republican Party in South Carolina between conservative champions and establishment lawmakers.

Champions of Conservative Values

The Hazlitt Coalition and our Freedom Caucus allies are known for their staunch advocacy of limited government, fiscal responsibility, and individual liberties. This year they outperformed their peers by a considerable margin. Their scores reflect a consistent dedication to the principles that have long been the bedrock of conservative ideology in South Carolina.

Whether it was standing firm on issues like medical freedom, fighting woke and wasteful spending, or protecting the rights of citizens, the Hazlitt Coalition and our Freedom Caucus allies proved themselves to be unwavering in their convictions. This group of lawmakers has increasingly positioned themselves as the true guardians of conservative values, often pushing back against the creeping moderation and compromise of the establishment. Their high scores on the scorecard serve as a testament to their influence and growing support among voters who feel that the traditional Republican establishment no longer represents their interests.

The Establishment: Lagging Behind

In contrast, the scores of the establishment Republicans tell a different story. Their willingness to compromise or adopt more moderate positions on key legislative issues has resulted in lower scores. The establishment has abandoned their commitment to the principles that resonate so strongly with the voters of South Carolina.

The Senate: A Collective Disappointment

While the House of Representatives saw a clear division between conservative legislators and the establishment, the South Carolina Senate's performance was marked by a collective failure to meet conservative expectations. Across the board, Senators from both the Republican and Democratic parties received dismal scores, reflecting a widespread dissatisfaction with their legislative efforts. The Senate's inability to deliver on key conservative priorities – whether due to internal divisions, ineffective leadership, or a lack of political will – has led to a sharp decline in their standing among conservative voters. Issues like government spending, health freedom, and second amendment rights saw little progress, and this stagnation is reflected in the low scores awarded to nearly every member of the Senate.

Hall of Shame

Several RINO legislators thumbed their nose at their constituents. In the House, Speaker Murrell Smith was the ringleader of the RINOs, scoring an awful 4%. On the Senate side, "former" Democrat Luke Rankin, the chair of the Senate Judiciary, scored an abysmal 11% and voted to gut Constitutional Carry. Senate Majority Leader Shane Massey offered Amendment 36 to water down Constitutional Carry, scoring a weak 21% freedom vote. Finally, Tom Davis, a liberty faker, made his full transition to the establishment this session, landed at 16%, and even demanded Conservative Champion Josiah Magnuson to withdraw his motion that killed the Healthcare Czar bill.
